





do: ensure all staff:

do: use 2-factor authentication

- Follow the instructions to set:
- 1a. Login approvals, and think about passphrases
- 1b. 3+ Trusted Contacts (Facebook):
 - Your trusted friends will help you if you can't login. Ensure they...
 - ...won't lock you out of Facebook for a joke!
 - ...use Facebook frequently
 - ...can be reached without using Facebook
 - Contact them first to let them know!





Personal reputation?

Hackers steal law student's Facebook profile and use hundreds of pictures in 'e-whoring' scam by claiming she is an escort

- · Jazmine Jores, 23, had her email account largeted by fraudsters
- They hacked into Facebook profile and stole 300 photographs which they used to set up escort profiles
- Police have refused to take action saying it is up to the social network

do: check for secure connection

- 2. the "s" in https (and padlock) in the Web address shows that your connection to the website is encrypted and more resistant to snooping
- If it is not there you may not be in the right site!



do: set your privacy and your app settings and be more mysterious

- 3. follow the instructions to set your privacy and your app settings and...
 - Be selective about friends and connections, and about apps
 - Be careful what you post, where you post, and when



do: protect staff and readers of your blog and Facebook

- 4. Social media policies and response guides, e.g.
 - set roles for the team, with more than 1 trusted person as admin (all admins should enable 2-factor authentication)
 - moderate comments and label tolerance level for negative responses
 - cope with trolls, online bullying and sexual harassment
- 5. Know what to do if hacked?






Are apps oversharing?





What info do you share with apps?






What info about YOU are friends sharing with their apps?
